INTERIM MINISTER'S COLUMN: Rev. Bert Marshall

GODISNOWHERE


The eye-teaser above is found in a book entitled <u>The Journey from Texts to Translations: The Origin and Development of the Bible</u>, by Paul Wegner. It's a beautiful book with many illustrations of ancient biblical manuscripts and fragments of manuscripts. Some of these are intended by the author to demonstrate the myriad difficulties encountered by translators when working with these documents. New Testament Greek manuscripts, for example, were written without spaces between the words, had no punctuation marks, and no chapter and verse divisions. Hence, the Gospels were read as one continuous story – which, by the way, is a very powerful and transforming way to read a gospel! To illustrate the difficulties of having no word divisions in the most ancient manuscripts, Wegner gives the above example: *GODIS-NOWHERE*. You've probably noticed by now that this collection of letters can be read in two ways: "*God is now here*". Two opposite meanings contained in the same phrase! For the translators of ancient biblical texts, these are tremendous challenges – and there are numerous instances like this in which the text is not clear.

How did you first read GODISNOWHERE? And how do the meanings of this conglomeration of letters translate into your life? For me, it's the ambiguity which translates perfectly: in my life, sometimes it seems that God is nowhere, and sometimes it seems that God is nowhere. Some days I search and search for God but find the world empty of divine presence and spirit. Other days, God seems to be *everywhere*, here now and there now and everywhere all around and in everything. GODISNOWHERE neatly describes, in its ambiguity, my experience of God as sometimes here and sometimes not here.

This kind of ambiguity in the biblical texts often manifests itself in translation, and in fact is usually *lost* in the act of translating. A good example is found in Luke 17:21: "the kingdom of God is within you". The Greek word here, *entos*, in addition to being translated "within", can also mean "among" or "in the midst of". "You" in this verse is plural, which adds to the possibility that Jesus is not speaking of a personal inner experience, but rather of a community experience. The bottom line, however, is that *entos* can mean *all of these things*: within, among, in the midst of. And it can have all of those meanings simultaneously - an ambiguity in the Greek text which is essentially untranslatable into English. How much deeper and richer this verse is if it retains that ambiguity! The kingdom of God can be within *and* among *and* in the midst of you. What a marvelous idea beautifully expressed in Greek! And what a shame that it's completely lost in English.

It is good practice for us, as people of faith and as people of the Book, to be constantly tuned in to God's presence in our lives, to recognize when God is near and when God seems far away. A regular practice of prayer and bible study is a good way to do this. When we pray and spend time studying our sacred texts, we discover what people of faith have encountered for many centuries: the mystery of God's presence and absence, the inscrutability of God's ways, and the imponderable depths of God's being. That this God who is at once "no-where" and "now-here" should care about us and love us unconditionally then becomes a truly amazing revelation.

Where is God in your life? When is the last time you went looking? When have you felt that God was looking for you? How did you respond? Are there times when you feel that God is nowhere to be found? Don't worry. Sit with it. Live with it. Work through it. Pray about it. Very often, God is in the ambiguities, in the places we've overlooked, in the spaces between the meanings of words, or in the places we fear to enter. God calls us from 'nowhere' and from 'now here'. Perhaps we could say that

MUSIC NOTES



BOARD FOR MEMBER CARE




