Have you ever heard the saying, 'Don't throw the baby out with the bath water'? I love that saying because it encourages us to change, to progress. Yet, it cautions us to do so intentionally, with care. It says, 'some things need to be thrown-out'. But it also says 'some things should not'!

Have you ever heard the African proverb, 'A tree cannot stand on the ground without its roots'? I love this proverb because it teaches us that we must know from where we come. Not knowing renders us insecure, unstable and susceptible to being lost.

Finally, have you heard the African proverb, 'We desire to bequeath two things to our children. The first one is roots and the other is wings'? I love this quote because it speaks a truth about the need to look and proceed forward, but with the grounding of the past.

All these sayings are relevant to our beloved Centre Congregational Church (UCC). I am a conservative at heart. By conservative, I mean I love the past – and I often don't want things to change. I am a trained historian, an archivist, a lover of museums and historic sites. I love old buildings, old cars, old music (Brahms and Beethoven). I love and accepted a call to Centre Church *because* it is a church with a rich and beautiful history that I want to see preserved.

That said, the viability of our church requires us to change, to adapt, to progress, to modernize. By *exclusively* holding on to the past (in terms of our building, our 'artefacts' and our culture), we risk alienating potential new members who are unchurched, wounded by the church, millennials, and/or families.

When potential new members walk into a church, they want to see a church that is active, intentional, relevant and vibrant now and moving into the future. I pray you will join me in discerning together 'what is the bath water' and 'what is the baby'? That which is obsolete must go. That which guides us must stay. In order to be more effective in proclaiming the gospel of Jesus Christ, our church environment should acknowledge our past, but demonstrate relevance for today and excitement for the future. To be modern and contemporary does not mean we must abandon our history and heritage. Surely not, I pray we can journey together to discover how to become more contemporary and thus relevant, without losing that which is timeless.

May's Second Sunday Offering was for the Brattleboro Summer Lunch Program that helps children who would qualify for free lunch during the school year by supplying nutritious lunches through Summer vacation. Thanks to your generosity and the best ever grant from the VT Conference ,we were able to send \$829.19 to Windham Southeast Supervisory Union (WSESU) this year!

June's Second Sunday Offering was for Brattleboro Centre for Children: \$500 was given, split between offering income and local outreach budget.

El Salvador Sister Parish Convention

The 5th annual Sister Parish Encuentro will be held in El Salvador in November, and I've already registered and gotten my plane tickets for November 6-12! This gathering of representatives from churches all over the world with sister parishes in El Salvador happens on the average every three years, and so far representatives from Centre Church have attended three of them. This one will be in La Palma, an artisan mecca in the mountains north of San Salvador, which I've never visited but for which I have heard lots of praise.


I've been asked why El Salvador is my 'Happy Place' and it's very hard to put it into words, but I'll try. A little history lesson: When I first moved to Brattleboro, I was aware that people in the town and at Centre Church had been involved in objecting to the U.S. presence in the Salvadoran civil War. Does anyone remember the 'U.S. OUT OF EL SALVADOR' spray-painted on the wall of the tunnel into Harmony Lot? After Jack Bixby and then Peter Abell traveled to El Salvador and brought back their stories, Peter and I and some others in the Brattleboro Rotary Club decided we wanted to help the impoverished people of this war-wounded country. Our first trip was a Rotary medical clinic in 1994 in a small refugee repopulation village; we also facilitated the first face to face meeting between Salvadoran Rotary Club members (the right) and former rebel supporters in the village (the left). Meanwhile, Jo Shelnutt-Melendy, our then associate pastor, adopted 2 children from El Salvador and we supported her on these literal, figurative, spiritual and emotional journeys. And meanwhile, Centre Church was in the process of getting established with a sister parish in El Salvador. Our next medical trip in 1997 was to visit this new sister church, Cristo Redentor, in the rural outskirts of Apopa, El Salvador. Over the years, as we tried to figure out what we could do that was most sustainable, two priorities emerged: education and safe drinking water.

We started the Luz del Mundo Scholarship Fund jointly with First Church UCC of Farmington, CT on the principle that the longer we can help keep kids in school the more able they will be to support their families later in life. Meanwhile still, the Brattleboro Rotary Club was working on water purification systems, leading to a 1998 water trip and eventually to the founding of Pure Water For The World. So, wearing multiple hats, I just kept going and going! Along with multiple other travelers from Centre Church, other churches, medical professionals, Rotarians, and just plain volunteers. Church trips, medical trips, Rotary trips, almost annually...I've lost count!

El Salvador Sister Parish Convention Continued...

El Salvador may be a poor and troubled country, but it's also beautiful. The smell of the air when the plane doors open after landing feels like 'I'm home!' Flowers, palms, sugar cane fields, beaches of black volcanic sand, flocks of cackling parrots, Spanish colonial architecture, raucous markets, brightly colored art and textiles. And pupusas! But best of all, El Salvador's people are beautiful. At Cristo Redentor, they may have very little money or material possessions, but the kindness and generosity is amazing. There's nothing like a delicious tipico meal being cooked over an open fire in a dirt-floored house with a tin roof and chickens underfoot; the love put into it makes it even more delicious. Through twenty years of the Luz del Mundo Scholarship, we have taken children from kindergarten to colleges and trade schools. Teenagers who have traveled there have truly had their eyes opened and been changed by the experience. And in the case of my daughter Kate, who first went with me in fifth grade, the trips have led to long-lasting friendships! I can't wait to go back again: to rekindle relationships among the other sister parish people, to joke around with Pastor Francisco Aguilar (who has visited VT a couple of times), to hug Samuel (who we brought up here for treatment at the Shrine Hospital) and his mother Antonia, to see how much Francisco and Gloria's daughter (Itzia) has grown, to visit the homes of scholarship recipients and hear how their school year is going, to worship and take communion at Cristo Redentor.

I hope some of you made it to the Windham World Affairs Council program on El Salvador held in our parlor on August 24. If any of this makes you consider coming along with me or brings to your mind questions, feel free to talk to me any time!
