Minister's Column-Scott Couper

"At Centre Congregational Church, No One Is Disposable"

One of my favorite books is *Life Together* (*Gemeinsames Leben*) by the martyred German theologian, Dietrich Bonhoeffer. Fascists of the Third Reich executed Bonheoffer in the closing days of World War II.

Bonhoeffer's seminal biblical text from which he wrote his book is Psalm 133:1: "Behold, how good and pleasant it is for [people of faith] to dwell together in unity!"

Bonhoeffer articulated eloquently that which I can only crudely: why I love the church, and in particular Centre Congregational Church.

"The physical presence of other Christians is a source of incomparable joy and strength to the believer."

"It is grace, nothing but grace, that we are allowed to live in community with Christian [brother and sisters]."

"Christianity means community through Jesus Christ and in Jesus Christ. [...] We belong to one another only through and in Jesus Christ."

Do not be mistaken! The affirmations expressed by Bonhoeffer were not sentimental. He risked and forfeited his life to realize genuine Christian community in a context that butchered, shot, gassed and burned that for which Christ represents.

I must confess, my faith nor intellect are as strong as Bonhoeffer's. Nonetheless, I am deeply thankful when I think of Centre Congregational Church and the gift that I have in serving and worshiping here with all of you.


In becoming sentimental and hopefully moving toward greater faith when appreciating Centre Church, I feel compelled to remind you that no one is expendable, *no one is disposable*, in our faith community. What matters is that 'we belong to one another through and in Jesus Christ!'

I know we all have idiosyncratic personalities. I know we all have our demons. I know we all are wounded. I know we have different agendas and political perspectives. I know that we have sinned against one another. All of that is true. I own that. But, here's the thing: the love of Jesus is greater than all that divides us. If the love of Jesus Christ supersedes all the reasons we should be apart, then we ought to take steps to restore 'Life Together' with those who have strayed from our fellowship or from whom we have distanced ourselves though we still worship together.

By taking proactive means to restore one of our own to our community of faith, we testify to ourselves the love that God has for us through Jesus Christ despite the fact that who we often are, how we often behave, and what we often say are not worthy of God's love.

This month, I want you to be able to come to worship with an offering to God. And I ask that the offering be an effort, an attempt, an act of reconciliation and forgiveness that welcomes all into our fellowship and affirms our 'Life Together'.

Jesus Christ and Dietrich Bonhoeffer died for what we have at Centre Church. Honor their sacrifice by cherishing and restoring our 'Life Together'. No one is disposable here!
