MINISTER'S COLUMN, Scott Couper

Dear Friends in Christ!

There is so much I am delighted with as it regards to serving this faith community at Centre Congregational Church. This month, I could write a hundred submissions to this newsletter – but Bruce will not allow me more than one. I could write on all the wonderful activities in which our church members participate (Compassionate Brattleboro discussion series and the Windham World Affairs Council events). I could write about all our awesome new members (Jeanushka singing in the choir, Shiva's upcoming book study and its introduction of contemplative mediation, and Gina's launch of our church Instagram account).

I could write about our church's consideration of participating in a church 'vitalization' program in which we can be 'coached' for a year. I could write about our leaders' consideration of enhancing the church's audiovisual capabilities for our parlor, sanctuary and 'chapel'. I could provide an update on our on-going Space Envisioning initiative whereby we are still seeking consensus on how to clean, clear, and intentionally designate and design for inspiration all our rooms and hallways. There is so much happening here – not to mention Lent and the upcoming Holy Week culminating with Easter next month.

Instead of focusing on any of the above, I have decided, as I did last month, to connect us to the wider church-with a letter from our Vermont Conference minister, Lynn Bujnak, which addresses an issue that recently hit our headlines. Last month, the United Methodist Church decided at its General Conference to continue the historical and theological exclusion of so many people from the Kingdom of God. No one should be excluded from ministry nor from the Kingdom of God based on who they are and how God created them. Not disabled people (in the Hebrew scriptures, they are excluded). Not women (in the Catholic tradition, they are excluded). Not people of color (historically they could even be held as slaves). And not homosexuals, bisexuals and transgendered people.

I felt called to the ministry at Centre Congregational Church because it is an Open & Affirming congregation, so decided on 24 November 2013. While I prefer that Methodists continue to serve the Methodist church, and while I subscribe to our denomination's motto "That They May All Be One" and desire no division between us and our brothers and sisters in the Methodist faith tradition, I would hope and pray that any Methodist would feel welcome at Centre Congregational Church: 'For whoever you are, wherever you are on life's journey, you are welcome here!' The Kingdom of God belongs to all and we pray that the Methodists will proclaim that truth with us.

For three years, I taught at a Methodist seminary in South Africa, so I feel strongly that that the below correspondence should be shared. Please find her correspondence below.

If one member suffers, all suffer together. -I Corinthians 12:26

Dear Beloved Community in the VT Conference,

Many of us have been watching and praying for our sisters and brothers in the United Methodist Church as they met in a special General Conference. The issues were the performing of same-sex marriages and the ordination of LGBTQIA clergy. These are issues many denominations have struggled with including our own at one point. The vote went against those who believe in a more inclusive church and for those who hold more traditional views. In fact as the resolution currently stands there is a doubling down on punishment for those who defy the Book of Discipline. It is not clear whether those additions will survive. It is not clear if the UMC will survive in its current form.

The Body of Christ is hurting. Once more those who are LGBTQIA and their allies have been told they do not belong in the denomination of their heart. This is heart-breaking. I admire those who will continue to advocate for a more open and inclusive church and know many of us will stand by their sides. I also know that for others, their spirits have been crushed by rejection.

Our Federated UCC/UMC Churches and pastors are especially caught in this painful division. Please keep our UCC clergy who pastor Federated Churches in your prayers: Rev. Kathy Clark, Rev. Marisa Laviola, Rev. Paul Eyer, Pastor James Mirriam, Rev. Jared Hamilton, Rev. Alyssa May. There are probably more and I apologize if I've left someone off this list. Pray for all of our Federated Churches and all UMC churches. Let us extend a welcome for safe space and a listening ear. Our congregations will continue to proclaim and live: no matter who you are or where you are on life's journey you are welcome here.

SPACE ENVISIONING PROJECT

Step I: Having completed the reconstitution of the "Faith in Action" and the AA rooms, the Space Envisioning sub-Committee, through the Buildings & Grounds Board and the church Council, proposes the following Step II scenario to continue to clear, clean, consolidate, designate and decorate each space in our church so that it is intentional and inspirational to each group that therein meets.

Step II: convert the Music room back to the Chapel (chapel, lecture room with audiovisual capabilities); convert the Library to the Music room (all music accouterments, except hand bells, found in current Music room, hallway, library, upper floor closet and corner room consolidated in the existing Library); convert the Corner room to a Deacons room (Memorial / Heritage room, Library, Meeting room) thus consolidating the deacons' accounterments in the hallway, library books, historic pictures in one beatified location; consolidate the Brattleboro Centre for Children's file cabinet in the hallway and accouterments found the corner room into the existing locking Archive room; move the contents of the Archive room to the upper floor locked walk-in closet in the hallway. With the Step II scenario, we hope to reconstitute three rooms and clear our hallways of clutter.

CHURCH VITALITY PROGRAM

A Report on the all day workshop on inviting new people by Roger Brown

On Saturday, February 9, Jenifer Ambler and I attended an all day workshop at First Congregational Church in Springfield, VT on how to attract new people to one's church. Fifteen churches sent teams to attend this all day event which completely filled the church fellowship hall. Our workshop leader was The Rev. Paul Nickerson, a UCC minister who has served several local church pastorates and lives in Beverley, Massachusetts. For at least the past five years he has been leading workshops like this one all over the country and with churches of many denominations.

The workshop followed a pattern of lecture and Power Point presentation, followed by a time where each team would apply the ideas to their church. So, by the end of the day each church had a list of specific ideas for reaching out into their community. Jenifer and I produced about six months of ideas for connecting church members to the community.

The entire focus of this workshop was on methods and philosophy for inviting new people into the life of the church and recommendations for ways the church could effectively address and nurture their spiritual needs so they might stay with us once they first attend worship or other church event.

The morning began with a slide of a castle surrounded by a moat - an image meant to symbolize to a rather extreme degree the idea that the local church has been focusing on itself more than the world outside of itself. We didn't think this metaphor fit Centre Church given our support of many local missions and non-profit programs, Loaves & Fishes and our El Salvador connection. However, the metaphor might also mean that to outsiders, the church appears difficult to enter and engage with as viewed by unchurched people. It could also mean that the church is so busy with its own internal business that there isn't much dialog with those on the other side of the 'moat' in the community.

Next The Rev. Nickerson suggested that many churches continue to do the same things they've done for fifty years or more, but these activities or programs or styles of worship are not effective in reaching new people because the culture outside the church has changed. The rest of the program concentrated on providing us with ideas on ways the church can make better informal connections with people in their local community.

The first suggestion was for church committees to begin meeting outside the church - in a local cafe for example. And then continue meeting in the same cafe at the same meeting time for every monthly meeting. However, it seems to me that some meeting agendas might best be not in public.) This idea was supported by a short video story of a pastor who kept hanging out at a local coffee shop, got to know the shop workers and some of the clientele. Eventually, one of them came to the pastor's church and later joined the church. Given this idea, the Mission & Service Committee is considering holding its meetings outside the church in a public place.

The next idea was to be present in some helpful way at public events and celebrations. Centre Church has already done this when they have sold drinks and snacks during the Heifer Parade. We propose the church might this year march in both the Heifer and the Fourth of July parades.

Another concept involved saying 'thank you' to some community group during a worship service - awarding them with certificates of thanks and recognizing their work in the community.

The key concept behind the ideas above is to develop new relationships with people in the community. Nickerson draws a contrast between personal or group connections that are relational and those which are transactional. So, for example, when a group like a singing group rents space in the parlor to practice, that's a transactional relationship. Relational is perferable.

Finally, The Rev. Nickerson talked about the importance of the church having a vitality (or 'Evangelism') team that coaches the church to encourages them as put these and other ideas into practice. We viewed a short video of the CEO of Google explaining how important it was for him to have a coach.


Another part of The Rev. Nickerson's consulting work is coaching church vitality teams as a follow up to a workshop. Multiple teams meet together with The Rev. Nickerson using the free Zoom online video conferencing service. Teams which make the commitment is to meet with The Rev. Nickerson once a month for a year via Zoom. He encouraged church teams to begin participating in this coaching process even if they were not yet sure they could commit to the process. This way, vitality teams would not lose momentum. Scott and I have already participated in the first call-in with thirteen of the fifteen churches who attended the vitality workshop. We plan to attend the next call-in on Tuesday, March 26 at 6pm, and hope others will join us. Scott will participate in the Pastors' call-in on March 20.

The coaching contract also includes monthly newsletters from Nickerson and unlimited email dialogs. I have just received the first weekly newsletter from Paul Nickerson. The topic is how to follow up with first time visitors.

We feel that joining this coaching process is critical for success. For without the support and mutual accountability, the energy for putting new outreach behaviors could dwindle and lose momentum. Furthermore, as teams share successes and failures, we will gain new ideas and be encouraged by one another.

We are in the process of seeking a way to find the \$1500 cost of the year of coaching. Five hundred dollars has been raised from the VT Conference. Meanwhile we're encouraged to continue to join the coaching process. The next step is to form a vitality team and attend the next coaching call-in on March 26. I personally encourage anyone interested to join the call-in, even if the vitality team is not yet formed, so as to experience and learn about the coaching process. In addition, I made a short report at the March Council meeting. Jenifer and I shared the workshop ideas with Mission & Service since we are members of that Board.

Thank you for taking the time and patience to read this summary. Copies of an annotated program booklet can also be made available for you to study these ideas further.
