MINISTER'S COLUMN, Scott Couper

Dear Friends in Christ:

As we are now ensconced in July, I am cognizant that this month marks one year since Centre Congregational Church called me to be its teacher and minister and my response in the affirmative. I am deeply thankful for the trust placed in me and I am more than pleased with our mutual decision. I deeply love this congregation and I pray I never disappoint you.

In order to celebrate our one year together, I thought we would indulge in another sermon series, this time, for three weeks (7, 14 and 21 July). On anniversaries, one is to reminisce on the past. In doing so, we mourn, we celebrate, and we discern so as to learn from that which has occurred. On anniversaries, we examine the present. Again, in doing so, we mourn, we celebrate, and we discern what to do in our current context. On anniversaries, one is to dream about the future. In doing so, we use the past and the present as our foundation that guides and inspires us towards a faithful and promising future.

Our sermon series in July entitled "Our Local Prophets" will examine three former ministers of this church who held a prophetic stand on a given issue and perhaps paid a price for their faithful witness. The former ministers of our church held controversial stands on Unitarian views (Wells), on temperance (Walker), contemporary theology (Clapp, Martin, and Day), love (Mighill), pacifism (Czatt), Vietnam and racism (Vander Meulen), international peace and justice (Bixby), and gay/lesbian equality (Edmonds and McFadden). As one reviews the history of Centre Congregational Church, one notices that more often than not, its ministerial leadership preached 'ahead' of a more conservative congregation and as a result of those stances (of course, as well as other unrelated factors) were frequently felt led to resign.

I believe Centre Congregational Church should take pride in the many prophetic stances of its former ministers. The Hebrew and Christian scriptures describe how prophets had always been criticized, rejected, and sometimes killed. Most notably, Jesus was almost thrown off a cliff for making that same point (Matthew 23:34-37, Luke 13:34, John 15:18-21, I Thessalonians 2:15)! During this sermon series, I pray we can take pride in that "great cloud of witnesses" (Hebrews 12:1) who have gone before us. I believe this month we can look back and remember our local church heroes (who I suspect more often than not included laypeople) in parallel with our biblical prophets. Let us remind ourselves of the controversies of the past and those men and women of courage who stood on the right side of the gospel of Jesus Christ and therefore on the right side of history. Let us pay homage to our former faith leaders by honoring their lives, by presenting their images and biographies respectfully and with honor in the Heritage Room, and by listening to their stories through the preaching of the Word. May their prophetic examples guide us forward.

BUILDING & GROUNDS

News from the Grounds to the Building - Lower, Middle, and Upper Levels



The Building & Grounds Board has been both addressing and praising the many projects, both outside and inside, from the bottom to the top.

The Ad Hoc Space Envisioning Team (Margo N., Bonnie G., Marion A. and Scott C.), along with the outstanding and supportive help from our Sexton, John Bertolini, has worked with the various groups and committees to relocate, consolidate, and more clearly define who we are and what we do. Thanks to everyone for cooperating on creating new, cleaner spaces as we move forward with more significant improvements.

- -Outside: Hedges, gardens, shrubs have refreshed several areas just in time for parades and Gallery Walks. Please thank Bonnie, Margo, Heidi Mario, and John Bertolini (and others you may know) who have spent hours digging in the soil, planting, weeding, trimming hedges, and mowing our lawn.
- -Inside, Middle Level: Rooms have been relocated, mainly in the Wells Wing. Give yourself a tour to see Faith in Action, Finance, Heritage, Nursery, Music, and Chapel. If you enter through our building's back entrance, you will admire the colorful Centre for Children mural, with its caterpillar logo. Tiptoe around the corner on the Lower Level and view the hand print flower creations as Terry Sylvester, the muralist, had the BCC's children assist her in the garden scene. All of this eye catching art was accomplished through the generosity of a bequest from Cynthia Terzariol and her daughter, Lisa Terzariol.
- -Upper Level: Here, two therapists have been our longstanding tenants along with Olivier Lefebvre, who has an office where he monitors cooking stoves in developing countries. Sadly, he, Logan, and their children will be departing town to live in France for a couple of years. Olivier's office will soon be available for rent. If you know of anyone who may be interested in this office, the middle-east room, please let Marion Abell know.

An AA group holds daily meetings in the large room at the end of the Upper Level corridor and is making good use of this space. Most exciting news - We are happy to welcome our new tenant, Gabriella Martin, a young artist who is locating her studio in the south-east office space.

Our Sexton, John Bertolini, has been most helpful in moving furniture, cleaning light fixtures, and waxing the floor to bring our Upper Level into a space of which we can be proud.

- -Lower Level: The Space Envisioning Team will be focusing on seeking improvements on our Lower Level spaces Memorial Hall, the stage, kitchen, and storage areas. Much of what happens here is our church's mission work Loaves & Fishes, Alcoholics Anonymous, and Carry Me Home. We are seeking suggestions from you and support in accomplishing a few miracles here in the coming months. Let's continue to make Centre Church a warm and welcoming place for everyone.
- -Security: In recent months some individuals have helped themselves to church members' belongings. Video footage was taken and the police were notified each time. Some discussion has taken place about locking the church doors on Sunday mornings shortly after our worship begins, but this has its downsides. Some churches, however, are choosing to do this to help with both safety and security concerns. If you have opinions about this, please share your thoughts with Building & Grounds people or the church Council.

We Are Climbing Jacob's Ladder

Last year our congregation voted to borrow \$40,000 from ourselves (our Endowment fund) to pay for the needed repairs and painting of our steeple. It has stood as a centerpiece not only of Centre Church but of Brattleboro for over two hundred years. That's history! Its reminds many people to look upward to the mountains and heavens and blue skies serving as an inspiration.

In the past few months, more people have contributed to our obligation to repay what we borrowed, and the most recent amounts bring the current total to \$28,500. This includes a \$3,000 anonymous matching amount. It should be noted that 70% of that amount has come from three families. So, we have climbed a few more rungs on our repayment ladder. Let's continue up to the top of the steeple, rung by rung, higher and higher, and celebrate - soon!

FAITH FORMATION

Greetings, friends in the congregation. As we come into the spring and summer months where the congregation gets a little leaner, I wanted to bring to your attention that Haley Marcil will be taking some time off from providing child care during service. Kate Maisner will still contribute, but not on a consistent basis. We are looking for volunteers from the congregation to help with child care as needed. This is not part of the church school curriculum, just simply watching over the children: coloring, reading, playing out on the playground, etc. We currently have a lead on a replacement for Kate when she can't be there, so there would always be two people in the nursery (the volunteer and either Kate or her replacement). Some parents will be in the rotation, but Kate and Haley feel from experience that this is sometimes a disservice because that parent often becomes distracted by their own and can't help other children in the room. Over the summer months, there are several Sundays where no children attend church that day. Yet, in the event a new family shows up, we would have the volunteer signed up to provide the needed child care in the nursery. 

Part Two: The First Steps Toward Vitality

In last week's newsletter, I looked at some of the signs of slow decline in our churches. I encouraged you to have an honest discussion with leadership to see if your church was trending in a downward direction. If the answer to some of those questions was "yes", then below are some initial steps to begin to move in a healthier direction.

- 1. Clarify your central purpose: I ask churches I am working with "what business are you in?" "Why do you exist as a church?" Often I get a lot of blank stares. Growing churches are clear that they are in the disciple-making/spreading the Good News business. Get clear on your purpose and help leaders to be able to say that purpose in one sentence.
- 2. Review the activities of your church for the year ahead: Based on a clarified purpose, take a look at the next church year. Stop doing events and programs that are off-purpose. I hear many churches say they would love to reach new people, but they are just "so busy". "So busy" at what? Eliminate or at least take a sabbatical for a year from activities that no longer serve the central purpose of the church.
- 3.Get out of the church and into the community: Take prayer walks around your neighborhoods and see the community with fresh eyes. Interview key community leaders such as police, fire, school, town government, etc. Discover the "pulse" of your town and the way God is calling you to serve. When we take the focus off ourselves and look toward the needs of others, we get healthier.
- 4. Pray a lot: As my colleague Jim Griffith (Griffithcoaching.com), says, "We are not starting Subway franchises; this is Kingdom work". If we want our church to move in a new direction, we need to pray fervently for God to open our hearts, deepen our faith and nudge us out of our church buildings and out into the market-places of our community. Read the Book of Acts; it's all about faithful Christians meeting people where they lived and worked. We can do the same.

Yes, the majority of churches in this country are in decline. But there are also churches that are growing, reaching new people and seeing God's Kingdom grow. Be one of those churches that is making a difference. Pray hard and work hard and you can have wonderful impact.


BROWN BAG LUNCH GROUP
