MINISTER'S COLUMN, Scott Couper

Albert Einstein once stated, "A human being is a part of the whole called by us 'universe', a part limited in time and space. He experiences himself, his thoughts and feeling as something separated from the rest, a kind of optical delusion of his consciousness. This delusion is a kind of prison for us, restricting us to our personal desires and to affection for a few persons nearest to us. Our task must be to free ourselves from this prison by widening our circle of compassion to embrace all living creatures and the whole of nature in its beauty. Nobody is able to achieve this completely but striving for such achievement is, in itself, a part of the liberation and a foundation for inner security".


Yet, during this time of COVID-19 how are we, who are ordered to sequester ourselves in our homes and to self-isolate, supposed to "widen our circle of compassion"? The directives seem contradictory. We are told on one hand that the best thing we can do if we are not essential workers is to 'stay-at-home' and essentially 'hunker-down'. Yet, on the other hand we are instructed by our scriptures, prophets, and philosophers to protect the most marginalized and aid those in need. The solution to the seemingly mutually exclusive directives is to *be creative*. Creativity is the means by which we escape from our conundrum.

I have been inspired by Groundworks Collaborative's "Camp for a Common Cause 2020" initiative. Groundworks designed a campaign that allowed us to sequester ourselves and reach out compassionately at the same time! Teams camped out, often in their front yards or in front of churches (Centre Congregational Church on Main Street), to visibly raise awareness and advocate for the most marginalized in our communities. Josh Davis as Executive Director hosted a wonderful 'telethon' that rivalled that of any for MS led by Jerry Lewis. I understand Groundworks raised enough funds to reach and exceed their goal.

I was also inspired by the One Community/ Home Together Concert initiated by Guilford Community Church (UCC) which aired on YouTube and our Brattleboro local access television station. Again, the concert creatively allowed all to stay safe at home yet come together as a community to raise awareness and pay tribute to health care providers and first responders in our community who are protecting us during the COVID-19 pandemic.

I was also inspired by the Brattleboro Area Interfaith Leaders' Alliance Earth Day Interfaith Prayer Service: "Lamentations and Resolve". I was able to worship with others outside, separate, and together.

The community of Brattleboro has utilized all of its *creativity* to enable us despite extensive restrictions to be together as a community, to raise awareness, and thus to be more compassionate. I am so proud of our Compassionate Community that enables us to "embrace all living creatures and the whole of nature in its beauty" despite the Vermont governor's justified orders for us to remain safe and at home sequestered from others.

It certainly has been an adventure trying to navigate church without being in the sanctuary. During our Zoom services, I have gone back to prerecording music with seemingly better results than playing 'live'. Matt Kennedy has figured out how to highlight hymn lines and also has added a cursor so now folks can easily follow the words online. In addition, Bruce has emailed copies of hymn for folks to print-out each week if they prefer to sing from copies.

Jenifer has been using her personal equipment to record all of my music each week and she and Matt have also been singing the hymns to help out folks online. We are aware the six feet distance is not enough while singing so we have adapted accordingly trying separate mics at a 20 ft distance. That sound didn't prove to be pleasing so we are back to using the camera microphoners but with only one person in front of it. We are keeping at least twenty feet apart. Scott also has joined us singing from further back in the Sanctuary. We continue working on getting the best result possible within the various restrictions.

During these crazy times, it is important to remember that folks are working extensively behind the scenes. We couldn't do this without Jenifer and Matt at the helm of Zoom. Bruce has added many things to his 'to do' list, making it possible for everyone to have the information needed to participate in our weekly services and regularly scheduled Church Council meetings. Scott pre-records his sermons in addition to delivering them 'live' as a backup in case there are glitches. With the exception of May 17, when Zoom had numerous updated software glitches, for the most part, online services have been going well.

Now, if only I could find a way to have my choirs back in action!



MISSION & SERVICE


Thank you to ALL who have been doing the work of Centre Church's Mission & Service Board. We as a church have continued to be active in service to our community, whether helping with Loaves & Fishes, providing meals for Groundworks, picking up prescriptions for members, or calling and writing one another. God calls us to care for one another and we have responded.

In May, we provided a meal directly to Groundworks at Quality Inn and at the time of writing this article, a second date is being planned. We deliver over 200 meals **twice** weekly from Loaves & Fishes to Groundworks, Morningside Shelter, and Foodworks. Many thanks to Ruth, Josey, Jean, and May for being at Centre Church twice a week to prepare these meals and organize all the prep that happens at people's homes, deliveries of food before, and being present for the Brattleboro Center for Children families. You can bake, cut, do dishes, and deliver food. There are all kinds of jobs with all different time and talent requirements. Our Special Offering in May was for Groundworks. Our contributions were made by participating in Camp for a Common Cause on May 1. This year we 'Camped In' due to COVID-19, so we were scattered from Brattleboro to Maine in our homes, on our porches, in tent in the yard, and even on the front lawn of the church. Thanks to Abi Healey and Jenifer Ambler for setting us up online and to all who contributed, camped, and rallied for contributions from friends and family. We raised \$730 of our \$1,000 goal.

June's Special Offering recipient is Brattleboro Centre for Children. Nan Mann has continued to provide childcare for essential workers, keeping the children safe and her staff employed. Though she received a PPP loan for employee salaries, there are many expenses. These expenses will be even greater as the requirements for safe opening are many and have added expenses. In addition to your regular church tithing, please consider a donation this month for Brattleboro Centrer for Children.

Thank you, again to all who made it possible for Emelio McCalla to complete the paperwork and immigration application for his two sons from Jamaica. The process was further aided by the Lobenstine Fund (a fund within M&S), a generous donation from Jack & Mary Ellen Bixby, and the generous time from Susan Miller, a retired immigration lawyer. BRATTLEBORO CENTRE for CHILDREN

June 1, 2020: BCC is re-opening in small stages to comply with the governor's directive that child care centers can re-open June 1. Our first stage had been emergency child care for a small group of essential workers' children. That stage ended May 29 at noon. Second stage is all four classrooms re-opening with a nearly full staff to a larger group of still essential workers' children. Stringent health and safety protocols are being put in place during this stage and the staff is educating families on these new procedures daily. In a couple or three weeks, stage 3 will be implemented, which is a return to more normal group size classrooms, but still with strict health and safety procedures in place. The director, Nan Mann, has been carefully researching and educating the staff and families daily. We are looking forward to graduating a class of children going to kindergarten in late August, but at this time don't know how that can look or happen due to restrictions on group gatherings. We know that having the children back is important to their social and emotional well-being and our support for working families is our goal. We are glad to be back!

COMMUNICATION from the WIDER UCC COMMUNITY

Church Vitality in the New Normal

Church consultant Paul Nickerson did a webinar called "Now What: Navigating Church Vitality in the New Normal" for Vermont Conference pastors last week. Let me share with you about the key points he raised. He first stressed that any online service should be seen as a mission effort and outreach to people beyond the church, and not just a service for members. With that in mind, it is important to not use too much "church insider" language in our worship, and to keep the service a little shorter and faster paced. He encouraged us in our worship services to invite people to something online during the week, whether that be Bible or book studies, social get togethers, mission projects, etc. This will allow us to get to know that newcomer in a more informal and smaller setting. He stressed the importance of inviting our members to invite other people to share in whatever online worship we might do. Many churches are connecting with people they don't normally see during this Pandemic time, so this is good news!

In the area of stewardship, he said that national statistics show that in general, churches are taking in less money than before the Pandemic. Worship services online should include an invitation to give, and an explanation of how to give. For churches not doing something online, self-addressed stamped envelopes mailed to members might serve as a gentle reminder of the importance of giving during this time. Any stewardship material should include stories about the way your church is making a difference in people's lives and in the life of the community in Jesus' name.

Finally, Paul spoke to the New Normal. He said that the Digital World is here to stay, and churches that are doing something now online should plan on continuing to do something even after we can gather together again physically. This time especially reminds us of the importance of a crystal clear purpose for our church, and the need to stop doing things that don't really tie into our purpose and instead to focus on things that do. Finally, he encouraged us to see the importance of making disciples as being far more important than how many hits we get!

This is a tough time for pastors and churches. I hope and pray that you are getting enough rest and time off in your life so that you can be open to thinking and praying about what your church is called to be in this New Normal. Lynn and I and Jesse and all of your colleagues in the Vermont Conference are here to help you in whatever way that we can.

We are with you

Dear Friends in Christ,

We send this with the magnitude of our emotions written large on the surfaces of our hearts, minds, bodies, and spirits. We feel deep pain, loss, and anguish on our collective behalf for all that we have experienced in the last two months. Worship in our sanctuaries has come to a sudden halt. Jobs and incomes have been threatened, if not lost. Loved ones have suffered or died from a hidden enemy for which there is no current remedy.

Our sheltering in place is exhausting. For many of us the loss of human contact, the drudgery of unchanging surroundings, our inability to frequent places that brought joy to our lives, and the call to adapt overnight to overwhelming change are taking a toll.

We are also witnesses in this time to heart-warming acts of human kindness and solidarity that speak to the angels among us. We are not only making great sacrifices, we are doing so in a collective effort to protect and care for the most vulnerable among us. The courage, stamina, endurance, compassion and empathy being practiced among us remind us that we do not grieve as those who have no hope. The power of a faith enriched by Easter joy and resurrection hope is not diminished by anything. Neither death nor life, not angels or demons, not power and principalities, not height nor depth, nor anything else in all creation can separate us from the love of God (Romans 8:38-39).

Seeing the church in and through this time fills us with a lingering hope in humanity, in the Body of Christ, and in the promises of a God whose only begotten child came that we might have life, and have it to the full.

In short order, states and municipalities are going to begin relaxing their shelter in place orders. We also write to strongly encourage you to give deep thought and prayer to how, if, when, and under what circumstances you will return to worship and other gatherings.

There will be a great temptation to rush back into our sanctuaries, celebrate victory over this corrosive and deadly virus, and return to life as we knew it.

Please think long and hard about that. There is no going back to life as we knew it. For a while at least, even what seems like a safe gathering may present a threat to the life of someone we love and care deeply about. Something substantial will emerge on the other side of this that we did not recognize before it started. Some of that we will accompany with our grief; and some of it we will receive as a gift from the God who is always about to do something new.

Please pay close attention to anything coming from your Conference offices about when you should return. Your Conference staff is keeping close watch on this and should be consulted before you make any decisions. If you want an example of a comprehensive look at what should be fully considered before making that decision, <u>check out this resource distributed by the Wisconsin</u> Council of Churches – it is the best we have seen to date.

You are all in our thoughts and prayers. All of us in this denomination are working, as one, to find our way through this. You are not alone. We love you all. We are seeing and feeling deeply your pain and suffering; as well as your heroic efforts to find meaning and healing in the midst of it. All of our own efforts are now being expended to help us find our pathway through this – a pathway we share in partnership with each other, and with the Holy Spirit of the living God and the risen Christ.

May the power of the love that created us, the love that redeemed us from the grave, and the power of the Holy Spirit rest upon you wherever you are on this journey. Lift up your eyes to the hills, from whence comes our help. The Creator of us all keeps watch. "All shall be well, and all shall be well; and all manner of thing shall be well." (Julian of Norwich).


