MINISTER'S COLUMN, Scott Couper

I would be a better minister if I could spend more time with our member Shiva Shankaran. His calm and wise disposition has much to teach me. Shiva recently lent me a book entitled *The Yoga of Jesus: Understanding the Hidden Teachings of the Gospels* by Paramahansa Yogananda. I have tried to take time during my vacation to bless myself with its insights. I would like to share one such insight with you.

Miracles of wisdom to enlighten the mind are superior to miracles of physical healing and the subjugation of nature; and the even greater miracle is the healing of the root-cause of every form of suffering: delusive ignorance that obscures the unity of man's soul and God. That primordial forgetfulness is vanquished only by **Self-realization**, through the intuitive power by which the soul directly apprehends its own nature as individualized Spirit and perceives Spirit as the essence of everything.¹

The concept of 'intuitive knowledge' intrigues me.

Throughout the month of March, we will continue to immerse ourselves in the season of Lent. Lent is perhaps the best season of the year (with Advent being a close second) during which we can best develop this 'intuitive knowledge' through this 'Self-realization' mentioned above.

Lent is a season of introspection – or Self-realization. What is self-evident about Self-realization is that it is done by one's self. Yes, the church can help. Yes, a labyrinth can enable us to focus. Yes, the minister can inspire. But the practice of self-realization has to be our own! We alone have to put the intention and 'work' in the process of Self-realization. No one can do it for us. Lent is a season wherein we interrogate ourselves. We evaluate ourselves. We are truthful with ourselves. We confess. We repent. We ask God to restore us. We do this mining: not our family, not our friends, not our church, and not our minister. We do it ourselves.

The Reverend Roger Brown also knows this. Roger also has much to teach us. Roger recently wrote to me in an email, "I see Lent as a time for personal discernment and spiritual practice".

It is my prayer that the COVID restrictions preventing us from administering the ashes this past Wednesday and the lack of 'Lenten' programming happening within the worship spaces of our church do not prevent you from drawing from *your own* spiritual well.

In this season of Lent, I am reminded of the story of Zacchaeus, the tax collector (Luke 19:1-10). If we reread this familiar story, we realize the process by which Zacchaeus receives 'salvation' (and what 'salvation' is is another whole can of worms!). The story does not say the scriptures or prophesy (that is, the Law) enlightened Zacchaeus, for he knew the Law as he disobeyed it. The story does not say that a priest taught him (that is, the minister of the church). The story does not say a service or ceremony transformed him. The story does not say that Jesus even did anything for him! No, what enlightened Zacchaeus does not seem to be any of these 'externals'. The story states quite clearly that Zacchaeus himself came to the realization that he wronged others and he, by his own volition, volunteered to offer recompense. That is introspection. That is Self-realization. Jesus essentially declared that Zacchaeus' inner spiritual resources restored a right relationship between himself and God. May it true for us this Lenten season as well.




From Music Director, MARY MILKEY-MAY



MESSAGE FROM THE WIDER CHURCH

A pear seed grows up into a pear tree, a nut seed grows up into a nut tree but a seed of God grows into God, to God. ~ Meister Eckhart

Lent is an invitation to reflect on our faith experience, a time to delve more deeply into the spiritual meaning of our lives. We study the life and ministry of Jesus for clues about the will of God and the work of the Spirit in the world. We seek fresh insight into the basic patterns of the Christian life prayer, worship, reading Scripture, and giving ourselves as servants of Christ.

During this 40-day period, we begin with ashes and commit to a discipline that we believe will ultimately be resurrecting! It may involve fasting from certain foods or activities. But it will certainly involve feasting as we gather on the Sabbath and receive the bread and cup of communion with Christ as nourishment for this spiritual journey.

We have an opportunity in these forty days to renew the commitment of our way to Christ. This is our chance to put our faith into practice in new ways. This is a time set aside for us to "grow into God, to God."

A short piece from the curriculum *The Whole People of God* provides an opening for us to choose how we will use this holy season. We are invited to...

> Fast from *pessimism*, and feast on *optimism*. Fast from *criticism*, and feast on *praise*. Fast from *self-pity*, and feast on *joy*. Fast from *bitterness*, and feast on *forgiveness*. Fast from *idle gossip*, and feast on *purposeful silence*. Fast from *jealousy*, and feast on *love*. Fast from *discouragement*, and feast on *appreciation*. Fast from *complaining*, and feast on *hope*. Fast from *selfishness*, and feast on *service*. Fast from *fear*, and feast on *faith*. Fast from *anger*, and feast on *patience*. Fast from *self-concern*, and feast on *compassion for others*.

Fast from *discontent*, and feast on *gratitude*.

Fasting and feasting – not just for the experience, but for the same reasons Jesus was led into the wilderness by the Spirit following his baptism by John. Jesus was preparing for the saving mission of a loving God – the mission of restoring creation, the human family, the sick, the lonely and isolated, the marginalized and vulnerable, back into the truth of who they are, beloved ones made in God's own image!

Just as Jesus was baptized and given a blessing, and then sent into the wilderness to contemplate that blessing, so it is for us. You and I – Christ's body on earth – have a mission, to share God's gracious love and resurrecting hope in every possible way!

The season of Lent calls us to choose: Choose life! Choose grace! Choose compassion! Choose justice! Choose blessing! In the desert experience of Lent, may God grant us to the grace to grow in wisdom and in love. In the wilderness of this holy season, may God lead us along the resurrection road to a place called hope.

What is your commitment this Lent? What do you choose to do or not do as a way to move toward the Center of this human adventure where we meet God?


