MINISTER'S COLUMN, Scott Couper

"My people will abide in a peaceful habitation, in secure dwellings, and in quiet resting places."

— Isaiah 32:18

The following was my appeal to Vermont legislators to improve access to affordable housing in Vermont. I made this appeal on November 15 on behalf of Vermont Interfaith Action and its Affordable Housing and Homelessness Organizing Committee in a joint press conference held in Montpelier and on our front lawn at Centre Congregational Church underneath the backdrop of our "A Just World for All" banner. Accommodation and shelter from the cold during Christmas and the winter months is for people of faith a theological and a biblical issue more than a political issue. "Mary and Joseph brought forth their firstborn son, and wrapped him in swaddling clothes and laid him in a manger, *because there was no room for them in the inn*" (Luke 2:7). May you and your family have a blessed Christmas and may we strive so that others might as well. Be well. In Christ, Scott

Good morning, my name is Scott Couper and I am the minister of Centre Congregational Church, United Church of Christ, in downtown Brattleboro.

With Vermont Interfaith Action and the faith communities that it represents, I advocate strongly that Vermont's leaders rapidly develop permanent affordable housing.

The Vermont Housing Needs Assessment for 2020-2024 makes it clear that there is not enough housing supply to meet current or future demands. This shortage is negatively affecting both low *and* middle income families. By 2025 new home construction is expected to be virtually stagnant, with the slowdown occurring in every Vermont county.

Because our state, including our beautiful town of Brattleboro, is in desperate need of affordable housing, we are thankful that this past April Governor Phil Scott and his administration proposed a Housing Recovery Plan that designates 249 million dollars over three years in capital funding for housing as part of his Economic Recovery and Revitalization Plan. This investment would bring 5,000 new housing units to the market making it "the greatest investment in housing in the history of Vermont".

To this 249 million dollars we say, "Yes!" Yet, as is often the case with plans, there is a "Yes, but..."

The "Yes, but..." to this plan is that the Vermont legislature has thus far only approved 150 million dollars. That is about 100 million dollars short. Therefore, Vermont Interfaith Action urges the legislature to approve the full amount and more planned by Governor Scott. Why more? We call on the legislature to allocate more funds for permanent affordable housing because additional federal funds are already available from the American Rescue Plan Act and from the infrastructure bill that was just passed in Washington. All of these funds are needed and must be supplemented with supports for mental health and substance use disorder treatment to keep people in housing. The problem is and will no longer be resources, but the leadership needed to ensure speedy construction of this housing.

This leads to my last "Yes, but..." Even if all the above is done it will already take years for enough units to be built to supply current demand. Funds must be allocated now, thus sending a strong signal to housing developers that more funding is coming so that they can continue predevelopment work to ensure projects will be ready as soon as possible.

Vermont needs the development of affordable permanent housing 'post haste'. This phrase, used since Shakespeare's time, has connotations of delivery *already* being too late. In Vermont's case, the construction of new housing is already too late. We need our leaders to act now, post haste.

By the time you read this, it will be the season of Advent – a time of joyful anticipation. Yet many around us are neither joyful nor hopeful for the future. At our Council meeting, Mission & Service brought us an exciting proposal – a chance for us to welcome strangers who are far from home, just as that unknown innkeeper welcomed Mary and Joseph so long ago. Refugees from Afghanistan will be arriving in Brattleboro in December, and we hope that we can provide them with more than a stable. They are looking for a place to worship, and we have a very large building and many resources. It would be wonderful if we could give them a warm welcome.

On the more mundane side, we continue to run a budget deficit (we spent \$6700 more than we earned in October). But it is not as bad as we anticipated, thanks to the Paycheck Protection Program from the government. And, we have been blessed with a large endowment. How can we use that for the greater glory of God? Must it be used only for capital improvements, or can we use it to improve the services we provide? By hiring a Christian Education director, for example? Or by giving raises to our hard-wording and deserving employees? By giving aid to refugees? By supporting our community outreach at "The Green at Centre"? We may never again have a balanced budget, but hopefully we will be following the example and teachings of Jesus Christ, and becoming all that God intends for us.

A card sale fundraiser and book sale are also connected to the event and can be accessed from the BCC facebook page. As the current director, I gave a speech which quoted in part from a *Moment for Peace* that board member John McFadden gave in 2021 "Maybe someday we will be known as that marvelous church that worships in the BCC building." We at BCC give thanks weekly for the support of the church, its membership, our friends, and families. Our gratitude will only grow as we do.

DEACONS

It's difficult to believe, but by the time this issue of **Centre Bells** hits your mailboxes, we will have just observed—or are just about to— the first Sunday in Advent!

...I have always thought of Christmas time...as a good time: a kind, forgiving, charitable, pleasant time: the only time I know of, in the long calendar of the year, when men and women seem by one consent to open their shut-up hearts freely, and to think of people below them as if they were really fellow passengers to the grave, and not another race of creatures bound on other journeys.

Perhaps we may endeavor to follow the example of Fred's repentant uncle, who, eventually, as we all know, vows to "...keep Christmas in [his] heart, and try to keep it all the year."

MISSION & SERVICE

Thank you to those who contributed in October to *Neighbors in Need (NIN)* and our three-pronged giving to United Church of Christ (*UCC*), *NIN*, and local outreach to the Multicultural Community Center (ECDC/Afghan migrants to Brattleboro) and the Rural Women International (Afghan judge program). Three hundred dollars is being donated to each of these organizations. We are so thankful for Joe Wiah's visit and presentation at Centre Church in October re: ECDC and his role as the director of the Multicultural Community Center in Brattleboro.

In November, we welcomed Susan Howes and Sarah Zumbruski of *The Help Fund* (SEVCA) on our Second Sunday. On the Second Sunday of December, we will honor *The Christmas Fund*, a UCC offering which helps retired ministers who need assistance; for example, a UCC pastor of one or more small churches. This pastor might not have received any benefits, putting stress on their retirement years. Many of our small Vermont communities have such churches, with part-time or seasonal pastors who then must serve a number of churches to earn a living.

On Christmas Eve, an offering will support the *Samaritan Fund*. This fund is a discretionary fund available to our minister, Scott Couper. This fund has been used for emergency transportation, overnight housing, food, diapers, etc. Our Christmas Eve offering is the primary financial support to replenish this fund annually, so please give generously.

Of utmost concern and focus for Mission & Service (M&S) this month is the upcoming arrival of Afghans to Brattleboro. Margo Neale has been committed to attending weekly meetings at St Michael's Episcopal Church, who have become a 'Sponsoring Group'. This group will be supporting several people/families when they arrive in mid-December. Their commitment includes pick-up at the airport, bringing people to their arranged housing, which the group has furnished and readied with food, linens, and other necessities. Further support of rides, orientation to grocery stores, banks, schools, public transportation, etc. will be provided by the church and the Multicultural Community Center/ ECDC, directed by Joe Wiah. M&S would like to help in any way possible. We have not committed to becoming a Sponsoring Group at this time, but feel that through St Michael's efforts, we can also provide help. Can you help—provide rides; orient

someone to a doctor's office, school, grocery store; provide furniture, linens, lights, warm clothing; make a call to welcome our new community members, or offer support through a phone call or a visit? M&S can help you find the right person if you can offer to help. Please contact one of the members of M&S listed below.

And lastly, seasonal meals to Groundworks Overnight Shelter on South Main Street will have begun on November 21 and will continue each third Sunday of the month. So, December 19 will be the next meal we provide. Unlike in the past, the meal is just dropped off at 54 South Main Street between 5:00-5:15pm in disposable dishes. There is no serving or clean-up involved. Our church sign-up will be posted by the first Sunday of the month on the Church Life Bulletin Board. Please consider donating to this meal. Both cooked and non-cooked items will be needed. All should be dropped off at the shelter, not the church. Thank you so much for participating. Whether you have or have not in the past, we need your help!

Project Feed

"How can we live with ourselves if our neighbors are living with hunger?" Project Feed starts November 1 through December 31, 2021.

Hunger has become an epidemic. Our friends and neighbors are having an increasingly difficult time putting healthy, nutritious meals on the table. Often hidden, hunger affects countless individuals and families in our community. In fact, there are over 5,500 people in our area that regularly use a food shelf or community kitchen. These individuals include senior citizens, veterans, and working families with children who do not earn enough to make ends meet (less than 2% are homeless). Project Feed the Thousands' mission is to address this epidemic.

Everyone can help. Project Feed the Thousands is unique in that **EVERYONE** can participate in some way. Whether you choose to make a cash contribution, pick up an extra non-perishable food item every time you go grocery shopping, or drop your extra change in a collection box, **YOU** are helping **YOUR** friends and neighbors fill a critical gap – the need for the most basic of human needs – **FOOD!!**

How Centre Church people can help: Everything people at Centre Church donate to in the name of Project Feed goes directly to Loaves and Fishes. Last year we brought in 3361 pounds of food and \$4220. Project Feed also gave \$4,500 to Loaves & Fishes. This was put into family grocery bags and boxes of food delivered to people at Dalem Chalet and the housing projects. Some of the food was put directly into meals which we served to the homeless in the motels and Foodworks food shelf. The donations of money gave us money to purchase more food from the Food Bank and for all the paper products to go meals generate.

What we need: Pam Carr who faithfully packages our family grocery bags has a list of needed items that we can't always get from the Food Bank.

- Canned goods especially with pop top lids: baked beans, beans, canned chicken, tuna fish, deviled ham, hash, fruits, and vegetables, spaghetti sauce
- Dry goods: crackers, individual packets of rice and mashed potatoes, mac and cheese, pasta meals
- And of course, cash donations

How to donate to Loaves & Fishes?

- There will be a bin at Centre Church.
- People can deliver to Loaves & Fishes at the church.
- People have ordered from Amazon and had food delivered to the church.
- Donations of checks can be made out to Loaves & Fishes with Project Feed in the memo.


MEMBER CARE
