INTERIM MINISTER'S COLUMN: Rev. Bert Marshall

Road Trip



One Saturday, maybe 15 years ago or so, I remember the phone system at our house in Plainfield was knocked out during a severe thunderstorm while we were at Tanglewood for a live broadcast of Garrison Keillor's A Prairie Home Companion. We weren't able to report the trouble until Sunday, and our phone service was finally restored on the Fourth of July. Meanwhile, our son Eli was trying to call and couldn't get through (this was before cell phones). He finally called one of his friends who lived down the street, and the friend drove up to relay the message. I rode over to his house with him and managed to connect with our son. As I rode home with our young friend, he remarked that he and another friend were planning a road trip in August. "Where ya going?", I asked. "Nebraska," he replied.

"Nebraska? Seriously? You guys have family or friends out there?"

"No. We just wanted to take a trip and we got out the road atlas and picked Nebraska because it's about half way across the country and we've never been there before."

"I was born and raised in Nebraska, you know." "Oh? Oh yeah, I think I knew that."

I could barely contain my excitement, not to mention my urge to become their personal travel consultant.

"Well," I said, "I could give you a list of places to see and visit."

"That'd be great," he said, with somewhat less enthusiasm than I'd hoped for.

"Yeah, like for example, there's a great blues bar in Lincoln. Right downtown. They get all the big name performers. They're on the big-time circuit, you know. It's called the Zoo Bar. I used to have a T-shirt."

It occurred to me almost immediately that this may not have been the best possible destination to recommend to two young guys just out of high school. Especially coming from a responsible adult member of the clergy.

"Sounds great!" he replied, with far more enthusiasm than I'd hoped for.

"Yeah," I said, "but, you know, there's also Triple-A baseball in Omaha. And there's a couple of fantastic Platte River parks. The state capitol building in Lincoln is pretty cool; museums and stuff. The plains are beautiful. I'll work up a list."

"OK. That'd be good. So, how long does it take to drive out there?"

"Oh, heck, I used to drive it straight through in just a little over 24 hours," I said, trying to cut myself off in mid-sentence.

It occurred to me almost immediately that this may not have been the best possible information to share with these two young guys embarking on their first cross-country trip.

"But now I take *two days* to make the trip," I quickly continued. "Stay in a motel on the way. You can make it to western Ohio, or maybe even eastern Indiana, in a full day's driving if you keep at it. Consolidate your stops. Yeah. Two days is definitely best. Construction slows you up nowadays, too."

He pulled to a stop in our driveway.

"Thanks for letting me use your phone," I said.
"I'll make up a list of stuff you guys can do while you're in Nebraska."

"OK. Great," he replied. "Where's that blues club again?"

"Uh, it's downtown.
Downtown Lincoln. Ask anybody. They'll tell you. I'll make you a list of things to check out while you're out there. Parks. Museums. Points of interest, you know."

"Cool." And off into the night he drove.

Sometimes you've just got to get out the road atlas, pick out a spot, and

go for it. I don't know how many trips I've planned



(*Road Trip*, cont.) by similar means. Churches need to do this, too, and this is my point. Open up the theological road atlas, unfold the map, select a destination, and head out: you share the expenses and the driving; you keep each other awake and alert. Set some goals for yourselves. Have some adventures trying to reach them. You are people on a journey. You *need* to be out there.

Every congregational study and survey I've seen, every article and book on church vitality and growth I've read, every colleague I've talked to over the last 20 years – they all overwhelmingly agree: in order to survive and thrive in the 21st Century, churches have to be willing to try some new things, work on some new ideas, be open to change, stop doing the things that don't work. Invite the Holy Spirit into your deliberations. Listen for the voice of God. Make worship a priority. Think creatively about mission and ministry. Recommit to outreach and service. Read the Gospels. Get *everyone* into the conversation. Pray without ceasing. Keep the faith.

You can tell we're well into summer, not just by the temperatures, but also by the fact that we don't always see all the familiar faces at Sunday morning worship. People are taking time with their families, or maybe just getting caught up with projects around the house. I know that my summer has been busy too, and I haven't made it to Sunday morning worship as often as usual.

Fewer people at Worship usually correlates to decreased pledge giving during the summer, which can put a bit of a financial squeeze on the church. One way we can help lessen the impact of the summer slump is to sign up for E-giving. With E-Giving you can have your pledge automatically sent to the Centre on a weekly or monthly basis. This eliminates needing to have to worry about remembering your offering each week, or having to figure out how much you need to "catch up" if you miss a Sunday or two. Plus, if you've already got E-Giving set up and you find yourself with a little extra in your pocket one week you can donate that towards your Pledge Plus.

Setting up E-Giving is easy. Just go to Centre Church's home page (www.centrechurchvt.org), click on the "Online Donations" link in the menu at the top, then click on "Click Here!" and follow the directions. Holly and I set up our E-giving last year, and it's so nice not to have to remember to grab an envelope or money as we're hurrying out the door on a Sunday morning. I encourage you to check it out and sign up.

BOARD FOR MISSION & SERVICE



The August **Second Sunday Offering** is Brattleboro Senior Meals, which encompasses the lunches served at the Senior Center and Meals On Wheels delivered to seniors at home. Affordable nutritious meals are a very important service to the seniors in our community, especially those on limited incomes.

Federal and State funding for such services has decreased recently, leading to even more need for community support.

"Hot meals are offered every day (Monday-Friday) at 12 noon at the Brattleboro Senior Center. For those over 60 there is a suggested donation of \$3.50. All those under 60 are charged \$6.00 per meal. The menu is set one month in advance, but is subject to change due to food availability and severe weather conditions. During special programs, times and fees are subject to change. Reservations are appreciated. Some special programs require reservations. Weekend meals can be arranged for take home on Fridays with the Executive Director or Head Cook. You must sign up before Wednesday. In addition, Brattleboro Senior Meals currently runs a breakfast program twice a week on Tuesdays and Fridays at 7:45 a.m."

"Meals on Wheels is a program that is designed to help people over 60 who face challenges in preparing healthy adequate meals due to such situations as advancing age, hospital recovery or physical disability. Any person over 60 who experiences "Food Insecurity," is unable to participate in the noon time meal available at the Brattleboro Senior Center or has a spouse who is eligible for Meals on Wheels will qualify for the program. BSM also serves participants who are under 60 that are funded through Vermont Center for Independent Living."

By the way, the best way to get in touch with me via email is at marymm55@aol.com. I didn't realize people were using my centrechurch account, which I don't always check, and missed some emails.






