Resurrection in Your Guts

I'm looking for this thing they call "resurrection". I'm trying to discover what it means. And if I discover what it means, then I want to know what difference it makes to know that. I'm interested in Jesus' resurrection as it's reported by the gospel writers and by Paul. The reports are quite different. They raise more questions than they answer. Paul, in the earliest known written account, insists upon resurrection to a spiritual body (1 Cor. 15); if that's the case, what happened to Jesus' real body? The gospels, on the other hand, can't make up their minds, but in some instances they insist on a bodily Jesus appearing to his disciples; if that's the case, how does he suddenly materialize in locked rooms and vanish from their sight?

It makes me wonder. What was it, exactly, that his followers experienced? In what sense did they see or experience him alive? Since they didn't recognize him at first, what convinced them that it was actually him? Why does Mark's Gospel end without any accounts of resurrection "appearances", and why do the other three gospels portray the resurrection of Jesus as having so little effect among those who encountered him? What are they assuming on the part of their first listeners; i.e. what do they know that we don't know? Only Luke continues the story, and at the beginning of Part 2 (The Acts of the Apostles) the disciples are still huddled in fear in Jerusalem, small in number and seemingly without purpose or motivation, until the fire of the Spirit comes along at Pentecost. Why wasn't resurrection enough?

The history and witness of Christianity is that *something* happened – something extraordinary – that propelled that small band of believers out into the streets and into the world. Our scriptures, however, do not tell us the whole story. They tell us what was being widely proclaimed at the time they were written down in the latter half of the first century. Stuff had already been happening for several decades, and that was long enough for numerous diverse traditions about Jesus to arise and circulate. Some of these were deemed heresies by the leaders of the early movement, some were accepted as authentic, some have been debated for centuries, and many were lost until the spectacular archaeological discoveries at Nag Hammadi in Egypt, in 1947.

Some of the Jesus traditions emphasize resurrection, others focus more on his suffering and death, still others are concerned primarily with his teachings or his radical ideas about God's realm. We might wonder, though, how far Christianity would have advanced in the ancient world without the accounts of Jesus' resurrection. Or how well it would hold up today.

All the accounts taken together seem to suggest that resurrection is something more than simply life after death. It has something to do with transformation, an entry into a new form of existence, or perhaps a return to a former way of being. And it has to do with being newly-recognized as the one formerly known and now transformed. Jesus' own resurrection depended for its completion upon his being recognized (*re*cognized) by those who knew him before.

I don't know what they saw. I believe that if they had taken the time to think through this clearly, to weigh all the evidence, there would be no such thing as Christianity today, no gospels, no church, no Jesus movement. The story is beyond rational knowledge. It defies logic. The early disciples must have had it in their guts, even more than in their minds. Resurrection deep down in their guts to stand up and proclaim God's liberation from oppression, intimidation, fear and death.

A little resurrection in the gut. Some fiery Spirit burning in your head. A crust of bread and a cup of wine. Imagine what a church community could do with that!


From Music Director, MARY MILKEY-MAY

Generous Centre Church goers donated \$1,244 for the One Great Hour of Sharing Special Offering in March.


PEACE & JUSTICE COMMITTEE
