

INTERIM MINISTER'S COLUMN, Rev. Bert Marshall

Traveling Light

I have a beautiful little book called <u>Journeys of Simplicity: Traveling Light</u> by Philip Harnden. It contains accounts of persons famous and not-so-famous who found ways to "travel lightly" on the earth. Harnden includes lists of these persons' possessions. Most of the lists are short. You realize while reading them that our own lists of possessions are considerably longer, more complex, and seemingly indispensable to a "quality" of life we have come to expect and take for granted. Harnden begins with this little story:

Twelve hundred years ago in China a middle-aged man named P'ang Yun loaded everything he owned onto a boat and sank it all in the Tung-t'ing Lake. After that, we are told, "he lived like a single leaf." See him there in the early morning, treading water in the middle of the lake, watching the last bubbles rise from the depths. The air crisp and quiet. The lake misty and as still as the sky. Then turning, stroking toward the shore.

And while we might not – probably can't – travel as light as the extraordinary people in this book, we can work on traveling lighter than we do. This is not easy in a society that lifts up consumer capitalism as an idol of worship and a symbol of success. We have to be mindful in our resistance. It takes practice. Here are some suggestions to help you travel lightly: (1) read scripture: read through the lectionary texts printed elsewhere in this newsletter, study them, meditate on them; (2) pray: for others, for enlightenment, for peace, for justice, for forgiveness, for someone you love, for someone you don't; (3) do some things differently: do one thing at a time, set aside some regular time to do nothing, turn off your cell phone or computer for awhile, watch less TV, take a retreat, do something you like but never have time for, visit a church member, write a letter, surprise someone with an act of kindness; (4) practice keeping the Sabbath: make Sunday morning worship mandatory, do something with family or friends afterward, try not to spend money or keep to a schedule, don't wear your watch.

Envision your worldly possessions – your share of the immeasurable excess baggage of our material culture – sinking to the bottom of the lake. Imagine yourself living as a single leaf. Think about Jesus sending the disciples out two-by-two, instructing them to take nothing on their journey except a staff – no bag, no bread, no money in their belts, but to wear sandals and not to put on two tunics. They cast out demons and healed the sick. What would our lives look like, feel like, sound like without all our stuff. In what ways would we feel diminished? In what ways would we be empowered? Imagine your life with only the barest essentials. Imagine being able to list everything you own on a post-it note or on the back of a business card. If you can, you are not far from God's realm.



How to Host Coffee Hour

Coffee Hour has been a Sunday morning tradition here at Centre Church for many years. Those who have done it in the past know how to go about it. One of the newer members said they would be willing to host this, but did not have a clue as to how to do it. So, we'll write some simple guidelines here. This is not to say that it is a simple job. Two or better, three people are needed to set up serve and clean up.

In the kitchenette you will find Fair trade Coffee Tea, sugar, and sweeteners.

You will need to bring 2 quarts of juice for the children's table, 1 quart of homogenized milk or coffee cream. Providing snacks is optional: some people bring cookies crackers, and cheese.

Plan to set up before church. The coffee urn takes about 1 hour to percolate. The proportions of coffee needed are posted inside the white wooden cabinet on the wall. You can prepare tea early as it will stay hot in the thermal pitchers. Use 3 tea bags for each pitcher.

Juice for the children can be set up on a separate card table usually close to the piano. There is an underpad to protect the parlor table in the large drawer with the other table cloths.

Those who have done this find that it can be fun, and a time to socialize. Your willingness to host is much appreciated as you provide a time for fellowship for many.






