## INTERIM MINISTER'S COLUMN: Rev. Bert Marshall

Dear Centre Church Friends,

In the interest of transparency and maximum clarity, I am reproducing here a notice I sent recently to many of our members via email:

I've been doing a lot of thinking and discernment work around the search and call process here at Centre Church, and my role as your interim pastor. I know there's been some confusion about the options, in terms of how long I would remain here, under what circumstances, etc. As best I can understand it, one source of the confusion has been the possibility of extending my ministry here in a re-defined role such as "designated-term pastor" or "transitional pastor," something like that. Such an extension was actually discussed and had been considered for a time as a viable option, although it was also dependent upon certain circumstances related to the progress of the search, my availability and willingness to stay longer, and of course the wishes of the congregation. It was an option that had some appeal to me because I love Centre Church and the prospect of sticking around a little longer seemed like a good idea and a good match.

On the other hand, holding out that option seems to have injected some uncertainty and lack of clarity into the search process, along with perhaps some untenable expectations for some, perhaps many of you. In addition, this year I have begun to feel that maybe my work here is drawing to a close, that I have accomplished all that I can. I believe we've done some good ministry here. I'm grateful for your love and support, your encouragement and faithfulness, the good and the bad, the ups and downs, all of it. But I think it's time to move on, and it's time for you to find that new settled pastor who can be with you for much longer than I can - someone who can help you grow and flourish into the coming years. That seems to be the best option.

So, on Friday (Aug. 4) I sent a notice to the church council and the chair of the search committee, informing them that I will not extend my time here beyond the end of my current contract, which concludes at the end of February 2018. That will mark three years since my arrival at Centre Church. Meanwhile, I look forward to seven more months of work and ministry with you.

Thank you for everything!

I want you all to know that this was not an easy decision. And I feel a sadness about it that will most likely increase as next February draws near. It has been a gift and a blessing to be part of this congregation's life during my time here. I'm grateful for what we've accomplished, and thankful for all the kindnesses that have been extended while I've been your interim pastor. I still strongly believe that there is great potential here for a thriving church on Main Street in downtown Brattleboro. I pray that you will find your path.

## How to Host Coffee Hour

Coffee Hour has been a Sunday morning tradition here at Centre Church for many years. Those who have done it in the past know how to go about it. We'll write some simple guidelines here. This is not to say that it is a simple job. Two or better three people are needed to set up serve and clean up.



In the kitchenette you will find Fair Trade coffee; tea, sugar, and sweeteners are also there.

You will need to bring 2 quarts of juice for the children's table, 1 quart of homogenized milk or coffee cream. Providing snacks is optional. Some people bring cookies, crackers, and cheese.


Plan to set up before church. The coffee urn takes about 1 hour to percolate. The proportions of coffee needed are posted inside the white wooden cabinet on the wall. You can prepare tea early as it will stay hot in the thermal pitchers. Use 3 tea bags for each pitcher.

Juice for the children can be set up on a separate card table usually close to the piano. There is an underpad to protect the parlor table in the large drawer with the other tablecloths.

Those who have done this find that it can be fun, and a time to socialize. Your willingness to host is much appreciated as you provide a time for fellowship for many.

## BRATTLEBORO CENTRE FOR CHILDREN

September is usually the "start" of a school year, but since Centre for Children operates year-round, it can sometimes feel like an awkward start. However, we do plan for changes from August to September, and it is a new beginning in some ways. We closed for a week at the end of August as we do every year, for in service for the teachers. We said farewell to six children who headed off to Kindergarten and that made space in the preschool for us to move up some of our oldest toddlers and younger children too. For those children, it really is a new beginning: a new room, new teachers, new classmates, and for their parents too. We spent many days in August preparing the children by having them visit their new classrooms and get to know the space, materials, and people they will soon see daily.



Something extra special happened on the playground during in service week too! The fundraising campaign of last December raised enough money for us to make the purchase of the "BCC Friend Ship", a large wooden playground structure shaped like a boat (perhaps the church school children can act out Noah's Ark on it on Sundays!) with a slide, a gangplank, a rock wall and a canopy for shade. It is manufactured by the Amish and shipped north to Vermont where we had it installed and built by professional builders. We want to thank everyone who donated to that campaign because we have something truly special for our children to play on now. Check it out sometime as you walk by!



The **Second Sunday Offering** for September (9/10) will be Carry Me Home, the charity hosted by Centre Church which uses the stage in Memorial Hall to sort and ship clothing to Syrian refugees in Eastern Europe. Since many refugees flee the Syrian war with few belongings, and end up in a colder part of the world than they started from, the demand is huge, especially for fall/winter clothes and children' clothes. FROM KART! Welcome New Kitchen Appliances: Rachael Ray, step aside. Julia Child and James Beard, look down from above; Martha Stewart, come stir a pot. These chefs supreme have created epicurean history and would be happy to come and see the new Centre Church kitchen renovations. A year or so ago, our church's SISP team used ideas and data from local architectural firm Stevens and Associates to assess our needs and determine how we might best use our existing kitchen space. They consulted with local restaurateurs and commercial restaurant suppliers to create an affordable, workable design. This meant replacing a decades-old gas range, a residential refrigerator and an old freezer. Along with very generous donations from several church members, friends who were actively committed to Loaves & Fishes, St. Michael's Church, and some grant money, the church was able to purchase the replacement equipment so badly needed to make food storage and preparation easier.



A new six-burner Vulcan gas range and a separate gas convection oven replace the decades old range, which was transported to a location in New Hampshire where another organization put it to good use. Through the recent efforts of Mission and Service, the Fundraising Committee and other church members, more community suppers have taken place and more are being planned for the future.

Loaves and Fishes volunteers from our church and St. Michael's Episcopal Church prepare nutritious meals every Tuesday and Friday throughout the year. These hot meals are created from food donated from local stores, the Vermont Foodbank, and many individuals. Several other mornings, volunteers store staples that are

delivered. In addition to the regular clients, children from Centre for Children are fed and many takeout meals are distributed to individuals and families in need of food during the weekends.

#### Loaves and Fishes

Ray

At every serving, Ray comes in after the first rush of diners. He stands patiently with his arthritic hands folded in front of him. He always says, 'Could I have one to go Ma'am." I once suggested that he might like to stay and eat and be with others. "I'm embarrassed to eat because of no teeth," he replied. So, each day at service he comes in and asks for one to go. He begins to talk a bit more. "I can eat two meals from all you give me!" "Thought I had skin cancer for 6 months. My father died of skin cancer. When I finally saw a doctor, he gave me an antibiotic for 14 days. Boy do I feel stupid but in 14 days I'm cured!" One day he handed me a folded check. I thanked him, put it in my pocket as I was serving. After service, I opened the check. Laboriously written with his arthritic hands was a \$10 check made out to Loaves and Fishes and in the "for" space at the bottom was written for "kindness."




